#### Sabbatical - A Time of Renewal and Refocus

On May 15, I'll be leaving the church for a three-month time of renewal and rest. I'm very grateful to the Session for granting me this time away. It is a luxury that few workers are granted by their employers; so, I don't take it for granted and realize what a special gift this is to me.

Several of you have asked what I'll be doing during this time. Is there a big project I'll be working on? Well, no. Will I be honing a particular ministry skill to help make me a better pastor when I come back? Not specifically. Will I come back to the church a different person? Well, I hope to come back rested and renewed. But I also hope to come back at least a bit more focused.

Speaking of focus, it's easy to become distracted. And in the last couple of years, largely due to events in my personal life, I've struggled with being distracted and not being able to focus like I would've wanted.

"Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her." (Luke 10:41-42)

What are those forces that keep us from focusing on the most important things, the "better part," as Jesus said to Mary? While Martha's activity was not unimportant (the chores that made for her gracious hospitality), it got in the way of what was ultimately important in the moment: hearing the Word of God so that it could be a guidepost for discipleship.

During this Sabbatical time, I hope to explore how personal and communal distractions get in the way of my work as a pastor and our work as the church. Some distractions are unavoidable (death, divorce, pandemics, etc.). However, can their effects be mitigated by some simple practices to keep us or get us back on track?

My summer will include some reading, some praying, some travel, and spending time with my family. And in the course of these many different moments, I hope to gain some greater insight on keeping what's most important at the center of my journey.

Please be in prayer for our church—that these three months may be a time of renewal for us as a church family and that we would be reminded of how important it is to focus on the important actions and priorities God has placed before us.

I am looking forward to this time away, and I am also looking forward to my return on August 14. Jessica Lewis, a candidate for ordination in our presbytery and director of the MAST program (Maryville Adventures in Studying Theology) at Maryville College, will fill my role while I'm away. She's fantastic! You will appreciate and enjoy her leadership. Rev. Hal Oakley and Rev. Wendy Neff will also be filling in on occasion. I'm grateful that these professionals and our terrific Session and staff will make my sabbatical worry-free.

Scripture encourages us to rejoice always, to pray without ceasing, to give thanks in all circumstances. But in today's world, that's not always easy.

## BUILDING COMMUNITY THROUGH GIVING

Outreach



As a follow-on to the information that I presented verbally to the congregation on volunteer opportunities as sponsored by the Outreach Committee, here is the information in written form. The Outreach Committee welcomes your time and talent participation in any of these mission efforts.

This is a brief description of the agencies that we support and the name of the FPC member who is the coordinator for that activity.

Mobile Meals-weekly delivery of prepared meals to people who are in most cases, unable to get out for meals and groceries. Deliveries are to the client homes within Knox County, one day per week. It can be a humbling reminder to witness the struggles that the clients endure when you meet them to make the deliveries to their home. But it is also a very personal interaction. FPC Program Coordinator is Irene Rice.

**Shepherd of Hope Food Pantry**- FPC partners with Faith Lutheran, Concord Methodist and First Concord Baptist. The pantry is held within the building of Faith Lutheran, our next door neighbor. It's open 2 days per month, first and third Mondays. Currently the food items are bagged before guests arrive and are handed to them in their vehicles. Volunteer opportunities exist when the pantry has food items to be bagged and also on days when the pantry is open for guests. Volunteers help with bagging, guest checkin, traffic controls, computer input and bag delivery. FPC Program Coordinator is Betty Nicholls

**Sunset Gap**-The primary function that the Outreach Committee supports is the Back to School backpack program and the Christmas gifts giving. I think most of you are familiar with these programs but if not, FPC sponsors students at school in Sevier Country and Cooke County TN. We provide school supplies prior to school starting and Christmas gifts during the holiday season. The twice yearly volunteer opportunities include sorting through the donated gifts and supplies, confirming all are received, and transporting these supplies and gifts to Sunset Gap. This is a popular program that FPC has supported for over 25 years. FPC coordinator is Debbie Long.

Volunteer Ministry Center-This is another food oriented program that we support. Once per month throughout the year, we serve meals to clients of the Volunteer Ministry Center on Broadway Ave in Knoxville. The Volunteer Ministry Center emphasizes providing emergency shelter and longer term housing for people without housing. This includes providing food and medical care to those folks. The volunteer opportunities includes food purchase, preparation, transporting and serving. Cleanup from the meals is not required! The coordinator for this opportunity is Jean Peretz. <u>Knoxville Area Rescue Ministry (Karm)</u>- An easy way to volunteer your time individually is todonate clothing and household items to one of the Knoxville Area Rescue Ministry stores. KARM provides services to people experiencing homelessness, addiction and poverty to get their lives back on track. When doing so, mention that you want the value of the items to be credited to Farragut Presbyterian Church. These credits are accumulated by KARM, and onceper quarter we are provided with cards for discounts on items at the KARM store. The Outreach Committee then donates these cards to designated missions to provide assistance to those using their services. Bill Nelson is the program coordinator for this effort.

<u>Outreach Committee Member</u>—The FPC Outreach Committee is a seven person committee who make decisions about expenditure of Outreach funds and mission agencies to support. We are looking for fresh voices and perspectives from new members.

The Outreach Committee has decided to end FPC's involvement in the Family Promise family hosting program. This decision was made in consultation with Beth Loyless, the FPC Mission Coordinator for Family Promise, after the hosting church we have teamed with for the past few years, Westside Unitarian Universalist Church, ended their involvement in the Family Promise hosting program in March. A replacement hosting church within the local Family Promise network was not identified. Beth and the Outreach Committee thank all of you who have participated in this worthy program over the past several years.

Thank you for your time and attention and I trust that this exchange has provided an update to the work that your Outreach Committee is doing. And lastly a big thank you to not only the program coordinators but also the many FPC volunteers who dedicated to these programs and serving God through their efforts.

#### The Stained Glass of Farragut Presbyterian Church - Emblems of Our Faith



There is a certain mystery to glass: It captures light and glows from within. It is a jewel-like substance made from the most ordinary materials: sand transformed by fire. Before recorded history, man learned to make glass and color it by adding metallic salts and oxides. These minerals within the glass capture specific portions from the spectrum of white light allowing the human eye to see various colors. Gold produces stunning cranberry, cobalt makes blues; silver creates shades of yellow and gold while copper makes greens and brick red.

Techniques of stained-glass window construction were described by the monk Theophilus, who wrote a 'how to' for craftsmen around 1100 AD. It describes methods little changed over the next thousand years. The Gothic age produced the great cathedrals of Europe and brought a full flowering of stained-glass windows. Churches became taller and lighter, walls thinned and stained glass was used to fill the increasingly larger openings in them.

Stained-glass windows are often viewed as translucent pictures. Gothic stained-glass windows are a complex mosaic of bits of colored glass joined with

lead into an intricate pattern illustrating biblical stories and saint's lives. It made the church that special, sacred dwelling place of God.

Farragut Presbyterian Church is fortunate to have a number of beautiful windows of stained glass in our church. The four largest windows in the sanctuary is the window at the front of our church, the rear of the church and on either side at the front of the nave. These windows were installed and dedicated in December of 1999. Each window was donated by a family in our church, in memory or honor of loved ones, and created by artist Karol Smith. Pictures of Karol creating our windows can be seen hanging in the narthex, opposite the kitchen. This article is the first in a series about these beautiful gifts to our sanctuary.

Perhaps the most prominent is the window at the front of the sanctuary. It was given in loving memory and honor of Charles and Bonnie Yount and Lloyd and Louise White by Leon and Carole Yount. Predominating this window is the empty cross in gold to suggest the glory of the Resurrection. Rays of light emanate from the lower portion of the cross, reminding that Christ is the light of the world and we are to let our faith shine in the darkness. Flanking the cross are images of the bread and wine - elements of Holy Communion; the flame of Pentecost; and a white dove. The dove is seen several times in scripture: when Jesus was baptized the Holy Ghost descended in bodily shape as a dove. It was also seen as a symbol of peace, because a dove brought to Noah a bough of an olive-tree as a sign that the deluge of wrath was at an end. In early Christian art the Apostles and the faithful were generally represented as doves because they were the instruments of the Holy Ghost, carrying peace to the world. These panels lead the eye up toward the heavens, viewed through the clear portions of the upper area.

The scriptural inspirations for this window are as follows:

Matthew 26:26-28 And as they were eating, Jesus took bread and blessed it, and brake it, and gave it to the disciples, and said, "Take, eat; this is my body." And he took the cup, and gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink ye all of it; for this is my blood of the new testament which is shed for many for the remission of sins."

Jeremiah 23:29a "Is not my word like as a fire?" said the Lord.

Acts 2:3-4a And there appeared unto them cloven tongues of fire...and it sat upon each of them, and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost.

John 1:32 And John bare record, saying, "I saw the spirit descending from heaven like a dove."
