Now's the Time

Ross Douthat, a writer for the New York
Times, wrote a piece on April 19 that painted a
bleak picture of our culture. Due to the rapid rise
of advanced technology and despite its many benefits, many
institutions we have valued for decades face extinction. Whether it's
churches, colleges, service clubs, or even humans' ability to engage in
relationships with each other, our way of life that has generated so
much prosperity is threatened.

Douthat writes, "In this environment, survival will depend on intentionality and intensity. Any aspect of human culture that people assume gets transmitted automatically, without too much conscious deliberation, is not going to make it.

"Languages will disappear, churches will perish, political ideas will evanesce, art forms will vanish, the capacity to read and write and figure mathematically will wither, and the reproduction of the species will fail — except among people who are deliberate and self-conscious and a little bit fanatical about ensuring that the things they love are carried forward."

As I read Douthat's piece more than once, I couldn't help but think of the Church and its gradual decline in our culture due to populations choosing to forgo faith in community. And I also thought of Jesus, who deliberately and self-consciously, and a little fanatically, went to the disciples more than once after his resurrection and made sure they knew that he was alive.

He was relentless in his pursuit of them.

We are God's agents. The church is a community of believers charged with sharing good news that Christ is alive. And in today's world, it demands a rather relentless commitment to telling others about Jesus and who he is. Not arrogantly, not boastfully, not selfishly, and not outside of our talents and skills. But instead, with humility, kindness, welcome, and a deep sense of concern for our neighbors, Farragut Presbyterian Church can be relentless in being the church God created us to be 40 years ago, albeit in a much different landscape.

We are a diverse and welcoming community of believers, called by God to be disciples of Jesus Christ and empowered by the Holy Spirit to acknowledge God's gracious presence in the world. Our faithful response in praising God encompasses compassionate service to all, nurturing one another to grow in faith together and sending out disciples to share the Good News.







In March, our Session endorsed an initiative called Horizon 2035, a process by which we move closer to the calling that God has for us over the course of the next decade.

You might recall the conversations that the Session commissioned our own John Sharp to have with all of us over the winter months, conversations that yielded tremendous insight from all of you but also included data that John provided us about the state of the mainline church in the U.S., the PCUSA, and the demographics of our congregation.

John wrote a final report with a series of recommendations the Session will begin to implement. As part of his report, John wrote this: "While in many respects [FPC] expresses its mission as well as it ever has, both the culture and the congregation itself have arrived at inflection points that must be faced. The data bear this out. Given long and clear trends, in another decade FPC will likely not have the range of options, vigor, membership and physical resources with which to catalyze a vision. Simply put, FPC will never be in a stronger position to discern and act upon God's preferred future for the congregation and its mission. Our time is now."

Our time is now to keep being relentless in our calling. The culture will tell us we don't matter anymore; that there's no use for us, a Presbyterian Church USA congregation in the heart of Farragut.

We have the resources to defy what the culture is telling us. We can keep being intentional, in ways that bring out the best in us, in sharing resurrection hope within our community. But it's going to take some changes. It's going to require us changing course a bit to keep fulfilling the purpose God established for Farragut Presbyterian Church forty years ago.

In my eleven years here, I've never been more excited about the potential we have to live into our mission. That we can relentlessly be the church by what we have to offer to our community.

Now is the time to act.

At its meeting on April 28:

The Session took two initial and important steps toward enacting the Horizon 2035 initiative (see above) it endorsed in March.

First, it hired Reverend John Sharp, Ph.D, as director of spiritual formation. In his role, John will lead the Horizon 2035 initiative and direct adult programming at FPC. John is a seasoned and accomplished pastor, scholar, teacher, and leader. He and his wife, Whitney, joined our congregation last year and are tremendous blessings to our community. John begins his part-time role on May 1.

Second, the Session created a Horizon 2035 steering committee to assist John in implementing the initiative's vision. The steering committee consists of Jeff Thode, Sharon Koch, Lynn Kszos, Tom Feldhausen, and Matt Nieman. The committee will champion the project and chart the steps taken to realize the vision of fulfilling God's call to FPC for the next decade.



Horizon 2035: A Readiness Plan for Farragut Presbyterian Church - Summary

The "Horizon 2035 Final Report" outlines a readiness plan for Farragut Presbyterian Church (FPC) to address current inflection points within the congregation and the broader culture, aiming for a thriving future by its 50th anniversary in 2035. The report is the result of a comprehensive inquiry into the church's identity, program, process, and context, utilizing data collection instruments, interviews, workshops, and reviews of church records and broader religious trends. The goal is not mere growth but discerning and moving towards God's calling for FPC.

The Present Moment and Key Findings: FPC was formed in 1985 through the unity of two churches, and its DNA is characterized by diversity, a robust love for God and neighbor, continuous learning, vibrant worship, genuine fellowship, and unconditional acceptance. Members describe FPC as feeling like family, with strong and encouraging leadership and an accepting environment. Notable strengths include a welcoming congregation, effective pastor, acceptance of diverse perspectives, strong mission involvement, quality music program, and a good balance in size. However, the church faces challenges, particularly the need for growth (especially among younger generations) and increased engagement across different groups. Key findings reveal that FPC's membership has a high median age of 70, and the average weekly worship attendance is around 150, placing it on the borderline between a pastoral-size and a program-size church. Importantly, FPC possesses an accepting identity that occupies a dynamic center, embracing diverse theological, political, and world views as a distinctive strength. Despite these internal strengths, cultural and denominational trends show a decline in religious participation and engagement, particularly among younger generations.

Conclusions: The report concludes that the current trends of aging and contraction are likely to continue without deliberate intervention. The church's functioning between pastoral and program sizes creates inefficiencies and missed opportunities. There is a lack of awareness regarding the current mission or vision statement. Addressing the need for growth, especially among younger demographics, requires a focus on robust adult programming that will gradually lead to healthier age representation. Intentional inviting by current members is identified as a crucial vehicle for potential numeric growth and congregational vitality. While learning is central to FPC's identity, Sunday School participation has declined, presenting an opportunity for revitalized spiritual formation offerings. Current campus utilization may be hindering the best expression of identity and programming.

Key Recommendations: To navigate these realities and move towards a preferred future, the report offers several key recommendations:

- Deliberately transition to and function as a program-size church. This involves shifting from a pastor-centered model to one where the pastor equips and inspires program leaders, distributing leadership and pastoral care more broadly.
- Evaluate and potentially adjust the Sunday Morning Schedule to allow more time for worship and Christian education.
- Establish The Mustard Seed Fund for bequests to support the church's mission in the future.
- Strategically allocate the budget, aiming for approximately 60% for personnel, 15% for facilities, 10% for missional endeavors, and 15% for programming.
- Actively reinforce FPC's identity around the tagline "Love & Learn" through a 4-6 week emphasis on its 40th anniversary, highlighting its core mission of expressing love to God, to one another, and to the world, and being a community of continuous learning.
- Execute a tiered, in-house capital campaign (Vision 2035) focused on enabling the vitality and mission of the church, utilizing reserve funds and congregational investment without incurring long-term debt.

- Increase the scope and visibility of church programs through "Quest" (spiritual formation) offering diverse learning opportunities, and "ReQuest" (ministry of invitation) encouraging members to invite others.
- Consider adding a global (international) mission component to the outreach efforts.
- Implement "Fresh Look II" facility upgrades, including audio and video capabilities in key spaces, improved gathering spaces in the Narthex, and screens in the Sanctuary for visual aids and enhanced worship.

The report concludes with a call to action, emphasizing the need to "Re-plant" the church for each generation while cherishing its essential traditions. FPC's balanced and diverse congregation is seen as a strategic asset in a polarized world, positioning it to be a beacon of hope through its unwavering commitment to Love & Learn.

MORGAN SCOTT PROJECT \$2,000

The Morgan Scott Project is a non-profit, serving the needs of the elderly, disabled and unemployed in Scott and Morgan Counties of Tennessee. They provide a common, multi-denominational base for churches, agencies and individuals to identify problems of and provide solutions for people in peril in these two very poverty-stricken counties in Tennessee.



Emerald Youth \$1.500

Emerald Youth Foundation is committed to ministering with Knoxville's urban young people right where they live, attend school and play. Our

desire is that we would engage young people comprehensively in three key areas: faith, learning, and health. Just lead is their youth leadership program that is implemented through a network of urban neighborhood churches and faith-based organizations located throughout Knoxville. Just Lead's afterschool program for elementary and middle school students includes tutoring, homework help, health/fitness/nutrition instruction, field trips and service-learning opportunities. They also offer discipleship opportunities for all ages, including mid-week Bible study, small groups, corporate worship and inter-generational faith activities. Calling & Career Ministry provides support services to high school students as they transition to post-secondary experiences as well as to successful careers and into their Christ-centered calling.



As school ends soon, some children will lose school-provided breakfasts and lunches. The Shepherd of Hope Food Pantry will help make up for that loss by having a special food distribution to families in need as identified by school social workers. Through Sunday, May 11, we will collect food items kids can have on hand that require little preparation. 


