

For the moments we lacked patience with people in their struggles, and for the places where we have grown too patient with the injustice, hunger and suffering in the world;


For the moments we placed comfort, ease and personal preference ahead of the call to humility, maturity and Christlikeness;

Notes On Science and Religion

Only in the last three hundred years have distinct categories of "science" and "religion" existed. St. Augustine, for instance, believed that *scientia* (the pursuit of knowledge of the physical world, material facts, nature) was the pathway to *religio* (wisdom, morality, meaning and values).

Scientism: When science *becomes* a religion (the final or only avenue for any and all truth claims). We feel that even if all possible scientific questions be answered, the problems of life have still not been touched at all. – Ludwig Wittgenstein, *Tractatus* 6.52

Superstition: An irrational view, often based in fear and ignorance. When faith is unwelcoming to science, inquiry and knowledge that fosters growth.

Science without religion is lame, religion without science is blind.

- Albert Einstein, Science and Religion, 1954

"Science can purify religion from error and superstition; religion can purify science from idolatry and false absolutes. Each can draw the other into a wider world, a world in which both can flourish."

- Pope John Paul II, in letter to the director of the Vatican Observatory

The idea that science and faith aren't compatible is a myth, and a recent one at that. John Draper and Andrew White were academics who wrote books toward the end of the nineteenth century that gave rise to the "conflict narrative" of science and faith. Their agenda was to make the case of the triumph of science over theology and faith – and the sole driver of human progress.

God's World/God's World

Most of the foundational work of modern science was accomplished by people who were also faithful Christians: **Copernicus** in astronomy and math, **Francis Bacon** in developing science methodology, **Kepler** in astronomy, **Galileo** in astronomy and physics, **Descartes** in math, **Pascal** in physics and geometry, **John Locke** in medicine, **John Ray** in zoology, botany and biology, **Isaac Newton** in math, astronomy and physics, **William Paley** in biology, and on and on. These were not simply occasional church attenders, but deeply spiritual souls, and in many cases, clergy and scholars who worked not only in what we call the sciences (natural philosophy and natural history) but also theology, spirituality and biblical studies.






