A New Thing

In Isaiah 43, God says in verses 18 and 19, "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."

This chapter is a powerful message of comfort, identity, and future hope for Israel, assuring them that God will protect them through upcoming trials and perform a new, greater work.

It reminds us that God is a God of new things. No matter the time or place in history, God is always at work doing something new.

As the new year begins for us, it's the perfect time to remind ourselves of God's posture toward creating new things.

We find this most impactfully at the time of death. Whereas flowers go dormant in the heart of winter and simply regenerate in the spring, God does something extraordinary: When we die, God takes what was dead and brings new life. It's the great mystery which only God can explain.

And, it is a gift of newness reserved for all of us. A glorious gift!

In 2026, let's look for the newness instead of the destruction. Let's celebrate what God might be up to—in the church and beyond. God is capable of more than we can imagine.

Lunch and Learn

We're launching a new time of fellowship and learning on Thursday, January 15 (and continuing every third Thursday of the month). We're calling it "Lunch and Learn." We'll gather for lunch together at 11:30 at the church in Room A or the narthex and follow our meal and fellowship with a short study of some of the giants of our faith. St. Augustine, C.S. Lewis, Thomas Merton, Henri Nouwen, and so many other famous scholars, pastors, and writers have so much to say about faith and God's place in the world. Matt Nieman and John Sharp will lead these brief discussions on these well-known figures and their ideas that have shaped our faith.

We'll limit our time to around an hour to make room for the other activities of our day, but hope you'll be able to join other members of our community in a time of relationship-strengthening and learning.

The meal will be catered, and the cost is only \$10 per person. You can sign up in the narthex on Sunday mornings.

Quest Sundays: Ongoing spiritual formation opportunities situated between worship services, meeting at 10:00am with childcare provided:

- **Pastor's Class** Meeting in the Library, this class is led by Pastor Matt or, on occasion, others. You will find a great mix of Bible study and engagement on topical matters at the intersection of faith and culture.
- **Soul Café** Meeting in the new Narthex gathering space. John Sharp will facilitate a lively, interactive experience around worship themes and content for the day. No lesson to prepare - come as you are!

Quest Groups: Building relationships and faith beyond Sunday mornings:

- **Small Groups**

- **Men's Bible Study**

Starting January 15 and thereafter on the third Thursday of the month at 11:30am. Come for the food, fellowship and finding deeper faith connections.

Questions Classes:

Spiritual formation should be practical, helping to address real questions, interests and needs that we encounter in life. These occasional gatherings meet at various times for a specific number of sessions.

- **The 5th Gospel**

People who live in Palestine and Israel often call the land of the Bible, "The 5th Gospel," as it tells the story of our faith in unique and unforgettable ways. Want fresh perspective and deeper understanding of a faith rooted in another place, time, language and culture? John Sharp has spent time in the Middle East, and wants to share a very experiential approach to Christianity's birthplace. This will be a pilgrimage for the mind and heart that provides vivid, lasting images and understanding that permanently enriches faith. Starting February 9, the class meets on Mondays from 5:30-6:30pm until Holy Week.

- **Elemental: Conversations in Science and Faith**

Launches Thursday, February 12 at 7:00pm. A majority of Americans believe science and faith are in direct conflict, leading to mistrust and misunderstanding of one another. How can faith and science better understand and inform each other? How can faith flourish in an age of science and technology? Bring a friend and join the conversation!




Here is the note from the Sunset Gap Christmas drive from the mother of a 6 y/o we sponsored:

Music at FPC

What a wonderful Advent and Christmas season we have experienced! Our musicians have really out done themselves once again. We began the Advent season with our 24th annual Farragut Presbyterian Church Christmas Festival, which again featured the collaboration of our FPC Chancel Choir joined by the UT Chamber Singers, and a large, very appreciative audience as we presented a number of seasonal favorites and a very fun sing-along!

The second Sunday of Advent saw our children present their Christmas pageant. There were a number of highlights from the pageant, but the Wise Men arriving on blow up stick ponies may have been my favorite! Thanks to the many people who helped with the pageant.

Our third Sunday of Advent brought us to our Twenty-eighth Annual Service of Lessons and Carols, a particular favorite of many of our congregation. We gathered once again to hear in scripture and song the miraculous story of Christ's birth. It was so exciting to have nearly 300 people experience this wonderful traditional service. It was amazing to run out of both candles and bulletins for the service! Everyone enjoyed the fantastic reception by our Church Life committee after the service.

Our Christmas Eve services, as always, are carefully planned to be so wonderful and meaningful. There really is something sacred and magical when the sanctuary is lit only by candles and our voices join together singing the final verse: Silent night, holy night, wondrous star, lend thy light; with the angels let us sing, Alleluia to our King; Christ the Savior is born – all with the beautiful star high above the stained-glass window at the front of the sanctuary. Thank you, Ken Ladrach, for the years of climbing the very tall ladder to make sure the star is always there.

I want to thank all those associated with the Music Ministry of Farragut Presbyterian Church for all the wonderful work they put into our ministry day after day, week after week, month after month. Most of our congregation is not aware of the many hours many people volunteer to our ministry to make it so successful. We appreciate so much the support of our wonderful congregation. Thank you to all for all you do!

Why We Do/Say What We Do/Say In Worship?

A few weeks ago, someone asked me about some of the elements of worship in our service and their meaning. In many of today's churches sometimes the language of worship has become common, often even losing the historical names of the parts of worship such as Kyrie eleison, Sanctus, Agnus Dei and even, Doxology. Over the next few months, I will offer up to you a brief history on the origin of some of the terms we use in our worship. Our worship at Farragut Presbyterian is rooted in thousands of years of history and religious practice and largely based on the Roman Catholic form of worship called the Ordinary of the Mass. Some of the elements we derive in our own service from the Mass are Kyrie, Gloria, Credo, Sanctus, Benedictus and Agnus Dei.

This month, we will look at the **Kyrie**. The Kyrie eleison (Greek, Κύριε, ἐλέησον, for "Lord, have mercy") dates from pagan antiquity and is found in 4th century Jerusalem. In Rome, the Divine Liturgy was first celebrated in Greek. As Latin became the predominant language, Mass was celebrated in Latin, but the familiar and venerated Greek prayer Kýrie, éléison was preserved, as were Hebrew phrases such as "Alleluia". The Kyrie was modified by Pope Gelasius I (492-6) and moved to the position in the Mass that is still used today. Pope Gregory I (d. 604 and for which Gregorian Chant is named), added the second response of Christe eleison.

It is worthy to note the Kyrie is the only part of the Mass that is in Greek – the rest being in Latin. Many composers throughout history have composed music for this text, including Guillaume de Machaut, Guillaume Dufay, Johannes Ockeghem, Josquin des Prez, Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina, Johann Sebastian Bach, Joseph Haydn, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, Luigi Cherubini, Franz Schubert, Ludwig van Beethoven, Gabriel Fauré, Hector Berlioz, Charles Gounod, Giuseppe Verdi, Ralph Vaughan Williams, Igor Stravinsky, Leonard Bernstein, Benjamin Britten, and Arvo Pärt.

The 'flavor' of the Kyrie music is very much tied to the textual meaning. As it comes in our service immediately following our Confession, it is truly a prayer of supplication to God for mercy and forgiveness: "Lord, have mercy; Christ, have mercy; Lord, have mercy." You will not find this text set to 'happy clappy' music. More often than not, the music is in a minor key and a slow tempo – reflecting the heavy weight of this text from a musical perspective.



At its meeting on December 9, the Session:

- Adopted the 2026 operating budget. It is a balanced budget totaling \$768,450 and is roughly equal to the 2025 budget. Thanks to the congregation for its generosity in committing to the church's work in the new year and to the Session's tightening of committee budgets in order to make it come into balance. The budget will be presented to the congregation at the annual congregational meeting on January 25.
- Approved the purchase of a large-screen television for the wall in Room A. It will be used to assist in teaching and other presentations throughout the year. The TV was funded from remaining parts of an anonymous gift given in 2025.
- Heard of the substantial progress made in the Horizon 2035 initiative since its beginning last May—new small groups formed, additional classes added, and relationships strengthened because of these new connections. A similar report will be made during the upcoming congregational meeting.
- Thanked outgoing elders Scott McKinney, Kathy Emmerson, Beth Honey, and Gayle Williams for their terms of service. New elders Dawn Zilles, Brett Eiffert, Joanie Scheuer, and Margo Gregory will be ordained/installed on January 18.
