## A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR REVEREND MATT NIEMAN

### *Sometimes the Games Deliver*

The Winter Olympics just ended in Italy. I caught glimpses of it throughout its two-week run. The Games always provide me the opportunity to witness athletes competing in sports I know little about, like curling and biathlon (cross country skiing and rifle shooting—who knew?)

Every four years, we catch up on these sports that are mostly out of our nation's consciousness. And we learn, we watch, and we cheer (Go USA Hockey!).

When medals are won or best-ever finishes are completed, we see the thrill of accomplishment on the faces of the athletes. The joy realized after years of training and commitment is palatable. And that's what keeps us watching—the hope in seeing a young person with only his or her dreams and the fortitude to make them reality.

The Olympic Games are not pure—they've had their fair share of scandal over the years. But as Jason Gay, a writer for The Wall Street Journal, wrote in his wrap-up of the Milan Games, “The Olympics are a colossal and often colossally shaky endeavor, historically intertwined with waste and overspending, but if you're looking for a sell, here it is: Every day, you can see the best day of someone's life.”

The best day of someone's life...that's what the Games deliver and what we get to witness.

For us non-Olympians, the best day of our lives might be one we've already lived. Or, it might be one that's yet to come. It might be one filled with athletic prowess or some other incredible talent. Most likely, though, our best day might have nothing to do with a flourishing talent or skill. Instead, our best day might be filled with an extraordinary amount of simple goodness.

What is something good about your life today? Whatever it is, remember it and build on it for all your days. There's more than enough pain and darkness to get lost in. Instead, find your way to the light by embracing what's good with each day.

Our theme for Lent is “Tell Me Something Good—Grounding Ourselves in the good news this Lent.” And the good news of Lent is the love and mercy that Jesus practices and preaches every day, including that which is intended for us.

That goodness can be a building block for finding goodness in all our days. And that makes for the best days of our lives.

## MENU FOR WINTER & SPRING 2026: For Adults

**Quest Sundays:** Ongoing spiritual formation opportunities situated between worship services, meeting at 10:00am with childcare provided:

- **Pastor's Class** Meeting in the Library, this class is led by Pastor Matt or, on occasion, others. You will find a great mix of Bible study and engagement on topical matters at the intersection of faith and culture.
- **Soul Café** Meeting in the new Narthex gathering space. John Sharp will facilitate a lively, interactive experience around worship themes and content for the day. No lesson to prepare - come as you are!

**Quest Groups:** Building relationships and faith beyond Sunday mornings:

- **Small Groups**  
Typically meeting in homes, with an emphasis on relationships and growing together – so they are smaller by design. We have multiple groups, with new ones being formed on an as needed basis. Contact the church office or talk to John if you're interested in a small group or want to know more.
- **Presbyterian Women**  
Currently three groups meeting monthly at 10:00 am (2nd Tuesday and 2nd Wednesday), all women are invited to be a part of these mid-week opportunities for Bible study, prayer and time spent together. This year's focus is: finding resilience, joy and our identity in Jesus Christ. Contact Janet Tinder if interested.
- **Men's Bible Study**  
Meets the 2nd & 4th Thursdays of the month at 8:00 am, in the Narthex. Great discussion, exploration of scripture, prayer, time together, and Chick-fil-a biscuits!
- **Lunch & Learn**  
Starting January 15 and thereafter on the third Thursday of the month at 11:30am. Come for the food, fellowship and finding deeper faith connections.

**Questions Classes:**

Spiritual formation should be practical, helping to address real questions, interests and needs that we encounter in life. These occasional gatherings meet at various times for a specific number of sessions.

- **The 5<sup>th</sup> Gospel**  
People who live in Palestine and Israel often call the land of the Bible, "The 5<sup>th</sup> Gospel," as it tells the story of our faith in unique and unforgettable ways. Want fresh perspective and deeper understanding of a faith rooted in another place, time, language and culture? John Sharp has spent time in the Middle East, and wants to share a very experiential approach to Christianity's birthplace. This will be a pilgrimage for the mind and heart that provides vivid, lasting images and understanding that permanently enriches faith. Starting February 9, the class meets on Mondays from 5:30-6:30pm until Holy Week.
- **Elemental: Conversations in Science and Faith**  
Launches Thursday, February 12 at 7:00pm. A majority of Americans believe science and faith are in direct conflict, leading to mistrust and misunderstanding of one another. How can faith and science better understand and inform each other? How can faith flourish in an age of science and technology? Bring a friend and join the conversation!
- **Coming in 2027:** Trip to Israel and Palestine - February 8-17, 2027. Cost will be approximately \$4,300 per person, all-inclusive. See John Sharp for more details.



## ♪...THE BIBLE TELLS ME SO♪



For many of us, these were some of the very first words we learned to sing (and say) about our faith – Jesus loves me, this I know... and they declare two critical realities: That Christ has an abiding and limitless love for us; and that we know this firstly because of the truth claims of scripture. Indeed, the Bible tells us so. Without the witness of our sacred text, next to nothing would be known of the historicity and vitality of our faith. So what else is the Bible trying to tell us?

Quite a lot, actually. But sometimes, with its language, culture and place in time being so different from our own, it isn't obvious what the Bible is telling us. What would happen if scripture opened up to us? What if a clearer, deeper and more vibrant understanding of what the Bible is trying to tell us leads to an inner conversation and understanding you weren't even sure was possible? What if the results are not only surprising, but even life changing? Quest is our churches ongoing invitation to open up that inner conversation. To take a next step in what our faith can reveal to us and how it can transform us. Menus are available around the church regarding Quest opportunities, but please let me mention three current offerings that are game changers in gaining understanding and engagement with the story of our faith:

Sunday Mornings – Along with formation opportunities for children and youth, The Pastor's Class (Library) and Soul Café (Room A) are tailor made to pair with our morning services, to provide a well balanced meal of grace and growth, worship and deeper experience of community and learning.

Geography of the Spirit – Currently meeting on Mondays from 5:30 – 6:30 in Room A, the focus here is a “virtual” trip through the land and culture of the Bible, to make a permanent difference in how deeply and fully we grasp the story the Bible is trying to tell. We're not just mapping places and events in the ancient Middle East, we're locating and nurturing these places internally as a living geography of the spirit – alive and interactive in all our waking moments.

Trip to the Land of the Bible – On February 8- 18, 2026 a group of us are going to the land of the Bible – and you're invited! Having taken several groups to Israel and Palestine, I've seen the profound difference this immersive experience makes – regardless of whether someone thinks of themselves as mature in the faith or not, or possessing a lot of biblical understanding or not. The experience meets people where they are. Brochures are available in the Narthex, and I'm always happy to talk.

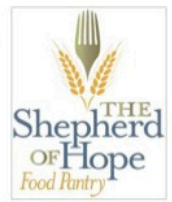

# Family Ministries @ FPC



Dear FPC Church Family,

As we enter the month of March, I find myself reflecting on just how full and busy this season can be. With the arrival of spring comes blooming flowers, longer days, and the reemergence of life all around us. At the same time, March often brings full schedules—spring sports, travel, and the anticipation of all that lies ahead. In many ways, it is a season of movement and transition, not only in our daily lives, but also in the life of the Church.

At the beginning of Lent, I shared a Children’s Moment centered on the mustard seed. Together, we reflected on how something so small can grow into something much bigger. I encouraged the children to remember that size is not an indicator of impact. Though the mustard seed is tiny, when it is planted and cared for, it becomes something far greater than it first appears.

In the same way, Lent invites us to consider how we might grow closer to God through small, intentional actions. Too often, we approach this season simply trying to make it to Easter without fully engaging the time of preparation that leads us there. For many families, this can feel especially difficult. This time of year is often filled with packed schedules, spring break trips, and the steady pull of competing priorities. In a season when we are invited to slow down and be intentional, life often seems to speed up.

But this does not mean that Lent is lost or that we have somehow failed. Instead, it offers us an opportunity to shift our perspective. Rather than striving for perfection, we can look for simple, flexible ways to incorporate faith into our daily lives—what I like to call “mustard seed moments.” These are small, intentional moments that may seem insignificant on their own, but over time have the potential to grow into something much deeper.

Mustard seed moments can be as simple as noticing how God showed up in your day, offering a short prayer at the beginning or end of the day, or having a meaningful conversation with your family in the midst of a busy week. They do not need to be grand or time-consuming. Instead, they can be small practices that help root us in the love of Christ. Even in disrupted and busy seasons, these small moments of faith still matter—they are what prepare us for Easter.

While March brings many things, I find it fitting that the last Sunday of the month also marks the beginning of Holy Week. Palm Sunday tells the story of crowds welcoming Jesus with excitement, not yet fully understanding what was to come. In a similar way, we are also preparing our hearts—often in small, quiet ways—as we move through this season. The seeds we plant now shape how we enter into Holy Week.

As we move through this month, remember that you do not need perfection, despite what the world around us may suggest. You simply need to begin. Plant the

seeds, even if they seem small. Over time, those small, consistent acts of faith create space for God to move in ways we may never expect.

I am so grateful to walk alongside you in this season, and I look forward to the ways we will continue planting seeds of faith together as we prepare for the joy of the Resurrection.

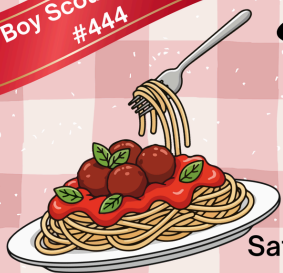

# *Music at FPC*

The last two months have been writing about the history of some of the parts of our worship service. We have, so far, covered the Kyrie and the Gloria.

Next up is Credo in unum Deum (I Believe in One God). The Credo is the longest text in the Ordinary and the last to be added, having been incorporated into the service in 1014 by Pope Benedict VIII. The twelve articles of belief in the Credo, or Creed, as we know it, are traditionally attributed to the twelve apostles who, according to tradition, composed the Creed on the day of Pentecost. While this is not certain, the text is thought to have originated in the age of Christ's apostles.

The earliest form of the Credo, therefore, was known as the Apostle's Creed and it tends to be the one we use the most often in worship at FPC. The Nicene Creed was approved by the Council of Nicea in 325 and also incorporated into worship. The Credo texts were gradually incorporated into the liturgies, first in the east and in Spain, and gradually in the north, from the sixth to the ninth century. It is generally recited in the Western Mass directly after the homily, and this also bares out for us at Farragut Presbyterian.

From a musical standpoint, this rich text has been set by many composers including Josquin, Bach, Schubert, Beethoven, Stravinsky and many others. In musical settings of the Credo, as in the Gloria, the first line comes as an incipit by the celebrant or soloist (Credo in unum Deum), and the choir or congregation joins in beginning with the second line. In mass settings of the Classical and Romantic period the Credo line is usually set for whole choir. The melody of the Credo first appears in eleventh-century manuscripts, but it is believed to be much older, and perhaps Greek in origin. In polyphonic settings of the Mass, the Credo is usually the longest movement.

Credo in unum Deum, I believe in one God,  
Patrem omnipoténtem, The Father Almighty,  
factorem cæli et terræ, maker of heaven and earth,  
visibílium ómnium et invisibílium. and of all things visible and invisible.

Et in unum Dóminum Jesum Christum, And I believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,  
Fílium Dei unigénitum, the only begotten Son of God,  
Et ex Patre natum, ante ómnia sæcula. born of the Father before all ages.  
Deum de Deo, lumen de lúmine, God from God, Light from Light,  
Deum verum de Deo vero, True God from true God.

Génitum, non factum, Begotten, not made,  
consubstantiálem Patri: of one substance with the Father  
per quem ómnia facta sunt. by whom all things were made.

Qui propter nos hómines Who for us  
et propter nostram salútem and for our salvation  
descéndit de cælis. came down from heaven.

Et incarnátus est de Spíritu Sancto And was incarnate by the Holy Spirit  
ex María Vírgine, et homo factus est. of the Virgin Mary. And was made man.

Crucifíxus étiam pro nobis sub Póntio Piláto; Crucified also for us under Pontius  
Pilate,  
passus et sepúltus est. he suffered, and was buried.

Et resurréxit tértia die, And on the third day he rose again,  
secúndum Scriptúras, according to the Scriptures.

Et ascéndit in cælum, He ascended into heaven and  
sedet ad dexteram Patris. sits at the right hand of the Father.

Et íterum ventúrus est cum glória, He shall come again with glory  
judicáre vivos et mórtuos, to judge the living and the dead;  
cuius regni non erit finis. and of his kingdom there will be no end.

Et in Spíritum Sanctum, And I believe in the Holy Spirit,  
Dóminum et vivificántem: the Lord and Giver of life,  
qui ex Patre Filióque procedit. who proceeds from the Father and Son  
Qui cum Patre et Fílio who together with the Father and the Son  
simul adorátur, et conglorificátur: is adored and glorified,  
qui locútus est per Prophétas. who spoke to us through the Prophets.

Et unam, sanctam, cathólicam And I believe in one, holy, catholic  
et apostólicam Ecclésiam. and Apostolic Church.

Confíteor unum baptísma I confess one baptism  
in remissionem peccatorum. for the remission of sins.

Et expecto resurrectionem mortuorum, I expect the resurrection of the dead,  
et vitam ventúri sæculi. Amen. and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Next month, we will learn about three elements of worship most often seen for us at  
FPC during Communion Sundays – the Sanctus, Benedictus and Agnus Dei.

At its meeting on February 23, the Session:

adopted a prioritized list of projects for Fresh Look II, a campaign to improve the narthex and sanctuary for our future ministry. The campaign, targeted for this spring, will aim to raise \$600,000 in donations over the next three years in order to fund the following projects:

- Redecorating the narthex, including new flooring and replacement of worn-out exterior doors.
- New sound system for the sanctuary
- New lighting for the sanctuary
- Video projection in the sanctuary
- Redesign of the chancel in the sanctuary, including a new platform for worship leaders
- Recarpeting of the sanctuary

Campaign material will be distributed to the congregation in March, and a series of informational listening sessions will be conducted in March and April. Commitment Sunday will be in late April.

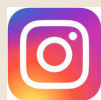
